- 2:00 It's two o'clock.
- 2:05 It's five past two.
- 2:10 It's ten past two.
- 2:15 It's quarter past two.
- 2:20 It's twenty past two.
- 2:25 It's twenty-five past two.

- 2:30 It's half past two.
- 2:35 It's twenty-five to three.
- 2:40 It's twenty to three.
- 2:45 It's quarter to three.
- 2:50 It's ten to three.
- 2:55 It's five to three.

We use AT + TIME when giving the time of a specific event.

- The class starts at nine o'clock.
- The flight leaves at ten to three.

We use IT IS or IT'S to answer a question that asks for the time right now.

What time is it? - It is half past four. What's the time? - It's twenty to five.
